I. INTRODUCTION

The COVID-19 pandemic has brought undeniable adverse impacts to all sectors of the community. Thousands of Santafenhon workers have lost their jobs and some were dis-placed due to shut down or closure of businesses. Many families came back to the Provinces to start a new life. The Local Government Unit through the Office of the Municipal Social Welfare and Development to makes great efforts to deliver the social services to the constituents. This Office also serves as a channel for the people access on the program and services of the National Government particularly The Department of Social Welfare and Development.

PROMOTION OF RIGHTS & WELFARE OF THE POOR AND THE DISADVANTAGED

Our social welfare services focus on welfare and protection of children, women, families and communities, persons with disabilities, older persons and solo parents. Accomplishment for CY 2022 in the delivery of social welfare services are:

CHILDREN'S WELFARE PROGRAM

Provided technical assistance, supervision and program materials to seventeen (17) Child Development Workers (CDWs) in the municipality providing Early Childhood Care and Development (ECCD) services to children at Child Development Centers.



CDWs have a regular peer mentoring among their groups focusing on the reproduction of program materials and preparation of documents.



Implemented 11th Cycle Supplementary Feeding Program (SFP) to five hundred ninety (590) children of Child Development Service Program (CDSP) from April 2022 to June 2022 funded by the DSWD in the amount of Php 1,062,000.00.

PERSONS-WITH-DISABILITY WELFARE PROGRAM

Registered 440 Person-with-Disabilities, 188 female and 252 male. Issued 145 new and renewal of Identification Cards.



OLDER PERSONS WELFARE PROGRAM

Registered a total number of ninety eight (98) Senior Citizens and issued them the OSCA Identification Cards. The OSCA also released Purchase Booklets (medicine and groceries to seventeen (17) Senior Citizens.

The Municipal Federation of Senior Citizen Association of Santa Fe has a Mutual Fund entitling the Senior Citizen members to receive cash ranging from Php1, 000.00 to Php3, 000.00 death aid from their funds. In 2022, twenty four (24) recipients benefitted from the fund with the total amount of Php 52,000.00.





The Office of the Senior Citizen Affairs (OSCA) regularly conducted the Monthly Meetings of the Municipal Federation of Senior Citizen's Association represented by Barangay Association Presidents.



COVID-Related Activities

For the months of January-March, 2022, the LGU of Santa Fe distributed food packs to a total of one (1) family with seven (7) members who were COVID 19 positive and quarantined at Municipal Isolation Facility.

1. CHILDREN'S WELFARE PROGRAM

The Provincial Government thru the PSWDO supports to Early Childhood Care and Development (ECCD) Program.

2. PWD WELFARE PROGRAM

a) PWD Social Pension

The Provincial Government provided cash grants to 87 qualified Persons-With-Disability under Social Pension Program of Php 500.00 per month, per beneficiary and released every quarter with a total amount of Php Php 3,000.00 for 2022.



CSIBALE, Inc.

CSIBALE or the Children's Sensory Integration Behavioural Approach and Language Enrichment is a non-government organization duly registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. Our mission is to create opportunities for the full participation of children's and youngster with disabilities and their families that will make them enjoy their rights on equal basis with other in the Province of Romblon.

Currently implementing Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) as a strategy in providing programs and services to 139 children and youth with disabilities in the province. With this, it aims to improve their capacity through provision of appropriate medical, educational and vocational habilitation services. It also aim to enhance the capability of their families in child rearing, managing behaviour and becoming active partner in implementing habilitation services and eventually become advocates on the rights of their children.





DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WELFARE AND DEVELOPMENT (DSWD)-Assisted Programs and Services:

1. CHILDREN'S WELFARE PROGRAM

a) Supplementary Feeding Program (SFP) 10TH Cycle

As part of the DSWD's contribution to the Early Childhood Care and Development Program (ECCD) of the government, the Supplementary Feeding Program (SFP) is continuously implemented by the DSWD through the MSWD Office. This program is the provision of snacks and hot meals in addition to the regular meals to children currently enrolled in CDCs and Supervised Neighbourhood Play (SNP).

In 2021, due to COVID 19 pandemic, the DSWD shifted from other modality. The municipality of Santa Fe preferred the center-based and cluster feeding. The goods were received from the DSWD FO IV-MiMaRoPa transacted through public bidding.

b. Strategic Helpdesk Information, Education, Livelihood and other Developmental Intervention (SHIELD)

The **SHIELD against Child Labor program** is a comprehensive project developed by the DSWD towards strengthening local efforts and convergence of services to help children engaged in child labor as well as their respective families. On January 24, 2022, the Office sent a communication letter to all the barangays of this municipality requesting the list of child laborers. The Office generated a total of eleven (11) child laborers in the municipality and submitted the list to the region on March 8, 2022. On March 23, 2022, Jennievie S. Famaranglas, the regional Focal Person of the

program, informed the Office of the proposed beneficiaries for validation. From the eleven (11) submitted lists, only four (4) were qualified for the following reasons: a) Age must be under 15 years old; from the submitted list, six (6) are between the ages of 15 and 17; and b.) Two (2) are twin brothers, with only one qualifying.

On April 2022, Mr. Ganza conducted validation for four (4) prospective beneficiaries of the program with Ms. De Jesus. Three (3) of them are from Brgy. Danao Sur and one (1) is from Brgy. Tabugon. After validation, two (2) were only qualified and all are from Brgy. Danao Sur. On April 22, 2022, the Social Case Study Report (SCSR) of two (2) eligible beneficiaries was submitted.

2. FAMILY AND COMMUNITY WELFARE PROGRAM

a) Balik Probinsya, Bagong Pag-asa (BP2) Program

The Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) continues to implement the Balik Probinsya, Bagong Pag-Asa program (BP2) which is open to all eligible Filipinos wanting to start anew in the provinces. The BP2 Program was enacted through Executive Order (EO) No. 114 to provide measures that can support the decongestion of urban communities through the equitable distribution of wealth and resources, and the provision of social services in the rural areas. Likewise, it aims to give the beneficiaries who decided to settle in their original hometown or in other resettlement areas, a wide array of opportunities, along with employment, industrialization, and

improved quality of services, to start a new life. Eligible beneficiaries of the program include those who are affected by government projects and legal demolition activities; families living on the street or in danger zones; victims of human-induced or natural disasters, including health hazards such as COVID-19 pandemic; individuals who lost employment or income opportunities; and informal settlers. Moreover, families belonging to the marginalized, disadvantaged, or vulnerable sectors who may wish to start afresh may also avail of the program. Other qualifications may include some crisis situations deemed acceptable and valid based on the assessment of the social workers during the period of application.

The municipality has twenty two (22) identified beneficiaries by DSWD for Batch 1. The DSWD conducted pay-out on February 15, 2022. Each beneficiary received Fifty Thousand Pesos (Php 50,000.00) for family transitory package and livelihood settlement grants. **Mr. Kennedy N. Salas**, SLP PDO2 Coordinator conducted close monitoring to these beneficiaries to ensure the grants were used for the intended livelihood project.



Partnership with Department of Trade Industry (DTI) Romblon on Training on Food Preparation and Food Preservations to SLP partner participants. It was observed that there is a need for additional intervention in order for them to enhance their skills and knowledge on the field of food industry. The participants gained skills on how to prepare, process and costing of Burger Patties and Longganisa.

Due to the successful implementation of the program, the BP2 Coordinator, **Mr. Jonel M. Musni** requested the Office to submit the list of returned families in the province for the BP2 2nd batch implementation. The Office submitted a total of Forty Three (43) families on March 1, 2022.

On July 7, 2022, the BP2 Management Office approved the request of the DSWD Regional Office for the additional subsidy of the said program. The regional Office assigned two social workers (2) in the municipality to assess the beneficiaries of BP2 second batch. Ms. Roxanne Uapal from SWADT Office and Christina Zilmar from the Regional Program Management Office (RPMO) are the social workers assigned in the Office. They conducted home visits and prepared the documentary requirements needed for the BP2 Batch 2. They were assisted by the MSWD Officer and Mr. Kennedy N. Salas, SLP PDO2 in the preparation of documentary requirements such as Social Case Study Report (SCS), ULAT form, Application Form, Family picture and Photocopied Valid ID with signature on August 6-8, 2022. These reports were submitted to the Regional Program Management Office (RPMO) on August 15, 2022.

After validation and assessment, from the forty three (43) submitted list, only thirty one (31) beneficiaries are eligible. These eligible beneficiaries need to prepare their project proposal for the making of Livelihood Settlement Grants (SLG). On October 17-19, 2022, Mr. Salas conducted meeting and dialogue to the eligible beneficiaries in the preparation with the said requirements. The Signing of the required documents for SLG project proposal for the beneficiaries was conducted on October 21, 2022. The pay-out for the thirty one (31) beneficiaries was on December 1, 2022. The amount received each eligible beneficiaries was One Hundred Thousand Pesos (Php 100,000.00) for the Transitory Family Support Package and Livelihood Settlement Grants.

b) Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program (4Ps)

The passage of Republic Act No. 11310 known as the "Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program (4Ps) Act institutionalized the said Program. Now on its 13th year of implementation, the Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program (4Ps) continue to invest in the health and education of poor and vulnerable household to break the integration cycle of poverty in country.

For the whole duration of its implementation, the Program had a total number of one thousand three hundred eleven (1,311) active household-beneficiaries that received the Conditional Cash Transfer (CCT) Program. The total amount released for the year 2022 is twenty one million three hundred eighty two thousand pesos (Php 21, 382,000.00) while unclaimed cash grants totalled to four hundred eighty three thousand nine hundred fifty pesos (Php 483, 950.00) for the following reasons: a) Set eleven (11) beneficiaries with cash card counts but no physical cards; b)Unclaimed cash cards; c) Cash card maintenance due to lost, damaged card and forgot pin; and d) Waiting for approved conversion and fund transfer.

c) Sustainable Livelihood Program (SLP)

The DSWD also continues to provide indigent Filipinos with access to sustainability livelihood opportunities through its Sustainability Livelihood Program (SLP). It is the Department's capacity building program that provides opportunities to increase the productivity of the livelihood assets of the poor, vulnerable and marginalized communities, helping them improve their socio-eco opportunities.

As of December 2022, the program was able to provide seed capital fund to fifty Three (53) Balik Probinsya, Bagong Pag-asa beneficiaries. The 1st batch with 22 beneficiaries received Php 47,500.00 each with the total amount of 1,045,000.00 and the 2nd with 31 beneficiaries received Php 50,000.00 each for the total amount of Php 1,550,000.00 for Livelihood Settlement Grant.



d) KALAHI - CIDSS National Community - Driven Development Program –BALIK PROBISNYA, BAGONG PAG-ASA (BP2) PRGORAM

The DSWD continues to empower communities in targeted poor and disaster affected municipalities to achieve improved access to social services through the implementation of Kapit-Bisig Laban saKahirapan – Comprehensive Integrated Delivery of Social Services (Kalahi CIDSS) National Community Driven Development Program.

The availment of Balik Probinsya, Bagong Pag-asa (BP2) Program paved the way to an additional KALAHI CIDDS in the amount of Seven Million Five Hundred Thousand Pesos Only (Php 7,500,000.00) for having more than twenty (20) BP2 Program beneficiaries. The municipality has twenty two (22) eligible beneficiaries for BP2 Bacth 1 with additional prospective beneficiaries for 2022.

The program provides assistance by enhancing communities and Local Government Units (LGU) capacity and by providing seed funding for community implementation of priority social infrastructure sub-project that helps reduce poverty and improve sustainability. Hereunder are the perspective sub-project proposal and sub-project title in various barangays of the municipality totalling to seven million seven hundred five thousand seven hundred sixty six pesos (Php 7,705,766.00) for the year 2022:

e) FOOD-FOR-WORK

The municipality of Santa Fe, just like other municipalities of Romblon Province are coastal areas. The Southwest monsoon or the "habagat" period covering the months of June to September adds to the flooding risks to almost eleven (11) barangays of the municipality. It is to be noted, that the areas not flooded in the last 5 years are now experiencing severe flooding. The municipality has lots of countryside developments especially on the road openings in the mountains and widening of roads to have a better road access that probably caused the heavy flow of rain water from the mountain. Southwest monsoon brings heavy rains that cause flooding. In order to manage its effects, preparedness activities are very essential. The onset of natural disaster can be sudden, but its effects/ risks experienced by the community may take long period/years. Preparedness activities should be done in the community.

The activity was done in the eleven (11) barangays of the municipality of Santa Fe, Romblon. The following activities are as follows: Maintenance of barangay road, road clearing, river dredging and embankment. The program is beneficial to the community to lessen the effect of flooding and for the government to lessen the damages of facilities and other infrastructures. Moreover, the DSWD is mandated by the law to provide the resource augmentation and ensure that it shall benefit the less privileged sectors of the community. The DSWD released Five Hundred (500) Family Food Packs to be used for the Food-for-Work Program of the eleven (11) barangays in the municipality of Santa Fe, Romblon from activities mentioned above.

f) AICS

Educational Assistance

The DSWD AICS- Educational Assistance helped students who are in crisis situation for their education such as school fees, school supplies, projects, allowances and other fees. Examples of Students-In-Crisis are: Breadwinner, Children of Solo Parents and distressed OFWs, Working Student, Parents with no income, Victims of Abuse, Abandoned Children, Victims of Disaster and Children with HIV positive parents. The documents required for Educational Assistance were Certificate of Registration/Enrolment or Statement of Account and Valid IDs of students and parents. Applicants who registered online passed through the assessment of DSWD social workers based on online registration. The Office distributed the QR Code to all the barangays of this municipality to assist applicants. The Office instructed clients to go to their Barangay Office for more technical assistance applying online. Students who idd not qualified are: 4Ps beneficiaries, Students from State Universities and State Colleges, those who receives scholarship in higher education from UNIFAST, Senior High School Voucher Program, Post Graduate Courses (Masteral and doctorate), Board Exam Reviewers and Program Beneficiaries of CHED, DOST and other government agencies.

The pay-out was conducted on September 10, 2022. The following are the number of beneficiaries for this program:

g) Kapit-Bisig laban sa Kahirapan-Comprehensive and Integrated Delivery of Social Services Kapangyarihan at Kaunlaran sa Barangay Cash-for-Work (CFW) Program for Persons-with-Disabilities (PWDs)

During this time of the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic, the vulnerability of society has increased to a greater degree, thus the exigency for immediate and even long-term interventions. In response to the need for the provision of social protection to Persons with Disabilities and the recognition of their human rights, together with the funding of allocation of the government the DSWD adopts the Cash for work Scheme in extending social protection interventions for them.

As of now, there is a total of four hundred fourteen (414) indigent Person with Disabilities in the municipality. The current situation of the Person with Disabilities leads to the implementation of the Department of the Social Welfare and Development to conduct Cash-For-Work Program for the selected Persons with Disabilities in the Province of MIMAROPA. The Cash-for-Work is a shortterm intervention to provide financial assistance to distressed/ displaced individuals by participating in or undertaking preparedness, mitigation, relief, rehabilitation or risk reduction projects and activities in their communities or in evacuation centers. Work areas/programs are identified by the community under the leadership of the Local Government Unit. In exchange for the work rendered, program recipients are provided with cash to meet their requirement for food and other basic necessities. Cash-for-Work may be undertaken before, during or after the occurrence of any disaster whether natural or man-made. The implementation of the Cash-for-Work was managed by the LGDs' social welfare and development offices in coordination with the DSWD MIMAROPA. The following are the objectives of the program:

- To provide financial assistance through short-term employment among PWDs to support them financially;
- ➤To promote the sense of belongingness in direct participation towards community driven development; and
- To encourage participation of PWDs to support the projects of the LGU for the development of their respective communities and municipalities.

A total of one hundred twenty two (122) PWDs benefited the program. Each of them received three thousand five hundred fifty pesos (Php 3, 550.00) as payment for ten (10) days labor. A total of four hundred thirty three thousand one hundred pesos (Php 433, 100.00) was spent for this program.

3. OLDER PERSONS WELFARE PROGRAM

> Unconditional Cash Transfer (UCT) to Indigent Senior Citizens

Indigent senior citizens in the municipality of Santa Fe received an Unconditional Cash Transfer (UCT) grant. UCT is a cash subsidy provided under the Tax Reform for Acceleration and Inclusion (TRAIN) law to lessen the adverse economic effects brought by the said law on poor Filipinos. It is considered to be the biggest tax reform mitigation program under the TRAIN law which seeks to provide 10 million beneficiaries with cash subsidies amounting to P200 a month for 2018 and P300 a month for 2019 and 2020.Under the TRAIN law, the total number of Filipino households and individuals who will receive the UCT is 10 million. The beneficiaries are divided into three main categories: 4.4 million members of the Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program (4Ps); 3 million senior citizen-beneficiaries of the Social Pension Program; and 2.6 million households from the DSWD's Listahanan.

The municipality of Santa Fe has 2,334 senior citizens as of December 2022. A total of 1,452 indigent Senior Citizens benefited the program and each of them received Php 4,500.00 cash incentives. A total of Php 6,534,000.00 was allotted for this program. Currently, a total of 108 senior citizen were unpaid due to the following reasons:

- No complete requirements
- Errors in the Land Bank data of senior citizen



Social Pension for Indigent Senior Citizens

The DSWD continues to implement the Social Pension (SocPen) Program to Indigent Senior Citizens. This is in adherence to Republic Act 9994 or the Expanded Senior Citizen Act which seeks to augment the daily subsistence and medical needs of indigent senior citizen. The program provides five hundred pesos (Php 500.00) monthly stipend to poor senior citizens who are frail, sickly, and with disability, without regular income or support from family, and with no existing pension from the Social Security System (SSS), Government Service Insurance System (GSIS) and daily organizations. Thirty seven (37) SOCPEN beneficiaries were delisted due to the following reasons: a.) Death; b.) Receiving other Pensions; c.) Barangay Officials and employees; d.) Double entry; and e.) With regular income.

An additional of 25 beneficiaries were included in the 2022 payroll and received the whole year cash grant in the amount of six thousand pesos (Php 6,000.00) per beneficiary.

For the year 2022, two (2) pay-outs were conducted by the DSWD FO IV-MiMaRoPa thru the SWAD Office, Odiongan, Romblon.A total of 1, 633.00 Senior Citizens benefited from the program with the total cash grant amounting to Php 9,798,000.00.

The DSWD Central Office conducted nationwide validation with an objective of knowing the economic status of the beneficiaries so to ensure the eligibility of current social pensioners as to clean the list. This validation resulted to the exclusion of Senior Citizens social pensioners in the payroll that stopped their monthly cash stipend.
